Interested students in grades 10-12 should formally express their interest to Mr. Burtch or another member of the TCS NHS Steering Team (i.e., Ms. Kohlbrenner, Mr. Schullery, Ms. Tilmon). Applicants will be assigned a mentor or two from the TCS staff who will help candidates strengthen their applications. Applicants will be required to submit a

personal essay and complete an interview in the spring of 2022.

As mentioned in the September newsletter, the NHS is a national organization for high school students in the U.S. Chapters can be found in high schools across the country. Selection is based on four criteria: Scholarship (academic achievement), Leadership, Service, and Character. TCS is home to the Mark Tucker Chapter of the National Honor Society.


In Mr. Burtch's Math class:


An absolutely timely read!




Nick, Nathan, Jack, Henry, and Justin gathered to play a strategy (and social opportunity) board game called Dixit. This is a "fan favorite!"




In Mrs. Griffith's English Classes:
