


A Lesson on Perspective

I have done this perspective lesson with some of the TCS students and they did very well with it. We've had some great conversations about all the different ways our individual






Why are these two characters arguing?



What could you tell them to resolve this argument?








They are both the same size!

Next time you feel an argument brewing, try to see things from the other person's perspective. What does the situation look like to **them**? This usually requires listening to them and controlling your emotional response. This may prevent a fight and keep you from taking things personally. It may also help you change your mind. Imagine that!

The context of a situation and its surrounding elements can also influence our perception of an event. So, try to not make any swift judgements until you have more information. Often, as more time passes and new information is gathered, our strong emotions give way to some level of understanding, even if some disagreement remains.

STEAM

Mrs. Fredericks's STEAM class is learning how to re-engineer electronic items by taking them apart and repurposing them for something else. One way is by taking apart a flashing bracelet and creating a paper mache LED candle, another is to take an LED candle and make a rocketship with LED lights for the fire. This included learning how to solder. Both projects included small circuit boards.





Environmental Awareness

Mrs. Fredericks's Environmental Awareness class just finished studying plastics. The students learned how plastics affect us and which can be harmful to humans. The students learned how plastics affect our environment and animals, and they learned about the Great Pacific Garbage Patch.



3D Printing

The students are learning the basics of 3D printing and how to create a 3D design. We printed one of our projects: creating a character in Tinkercad. The students learned that it wasn't easy to add items to the base object.



Photography



Mrs. Fredericks's Photography class is learning the basics of photography. We just reviewed "Aperture" and what different apertures to use and when and how it affects depth of field. We took dozens of pictures at different aperture settings. We've been photographing items that had words on them so we could see if the image was sharp or out of focus. They did a great job with this! They also learned how to upload images. We just started ISO and how it relates to aperture.

In Mr. Burtch's Math class:

After winning a passion fruit flavored Jarritos soda, Mark Mack explained, "my 'passion' for Geometry has increased geometrically".



In Mrs. Griffith's English classes:


First Period began their study of Mary Shelley's Frankenstein.


Second and Fourth Periods will find out if Brian survives as they finish Gary Paulsen's *Hatchet*.




NATIONAL HISTORY DAY®

The morning was filled with healthy historical dialogue and everyone learned about each other's interests and discussed well researched historical information.
























Bee update...

Question: Where do bees go for the winter? Florida, Trinidad, or Brazil? Answer: They stay put in our climate for the entire winter.

Now that the cold weather is receding, we are taking stock of our bee community and their winter experience. How did they do? As a community of bees, they did well. Here's what happened during the cold weather months:

- 1. The colony's population declined as there was less work to do during the winter months (no pollen to gather), and their food supply was limited.
- 2. The bees became much less active. The moved very slowly if at all.
- 3. During the cold weather, they stayed well away from the portal to their egress pipe to the great outdoors.
- 4. During occasional mild days during the winter, they would get active and fly outside the hive, even if the outside temperature was only in the 30s!
- 5. While the lower part of the hive was cool to the touch, the upper parts of the hive was warm because the motion of a few thousand bees, even if minimal, produces heat!

As the spring draws near, we are seeing signs that just like us, they are getting ready for spring. We just recently started seeing some bees with pollen in their "pollen baskets" (areas of their legs that are specifically designed to carry pollen) ... which means that they are braving the cold and collecting the earliest sources of pollen.


