TCS has six seniors taking Financial Math this year. The course has evolved over the years. But it is designed for students who will graduate soon and move on to the challenges of adulthood. The course covers a wide variety of subjects including expenses, pay, budgeting, taxes, inflation and interest (and maybe even foreign exchange), banking, borrowing (including credit cards) and investing. In addition to learning and developing math, finance and economics skills, students also will learn how to use spreadsheets and some of the behaviors they will need to succeed in the working or college world after graduation. The students' first big project will be an in-depth analysis of real-world expenses tied to a weeklong trip to Chicago.




These photos with real life usage of math may change a student's way of thinking about learning math.

Mrs. Zoccoli & Mr. Burtch's Math Classes:


NEW ONLINE MATH SYSTEM!

TCS has purchased a one-year subscription to the online Math System, IXL. This tool will help to enhance our students' abilities to apply, practice, and reinforce many math skills.

IXL augments the online Khan Academy Math Learning Modules, which TCS already uses, and the DESMOS graphing system. IXL problems come in a variety of formats: multiple choice answers, move tiles around, fill in the blanks. Correct answers are rewarded by awarding points to students. As they build their way to 100 percent, they receive affirmation ribbons along the way.

Incorrect answers pull up descriptions of the steps necessary to calculate the correct answer to that problem. IXL then drops the accumulated score by a reasonable amount, and the system assigns more questions of the same topic to evaluate the students' continued understanding. IXL may be accessed from home using the student's log-in information, once the student's personal account is set up.

This is an example of the skills included in a typical eighth grade curriculum.

Students in Mrs. Griffith's classes are off to a super start!

We began the year in epistolary manner by writing, identifying main ideas, and narration; we learned reciprocity, and students were excited to receive hand-written letters at their homes!

Jamboards, black-out poetry, illustrations of "The Tell-Tale Heart", "The Cask of Amontillado", as well as deep dives into "The Raven" and "Annabel Lee" were all fun activities designed to create rapport and to get back into the swing of literature as we head into spooky season!

We are all excited to visit Hedgerow Theater for the Edgar Allan Poe Festival this month.

Creative Writing students introduced themselves through Meme as Writer presentations as well as "Poetic Hellos", acrostics, and zines. They are writing daily and learning to challenge themselves through using different voices, synonyms, and point of view.



A special shout-out to LeSabien Brown who took an intensive weekend audition course at Hedgerow Theater! Way to step out of your comfort zone, LeSabien!





ELA with Mrs. Wright

What a wonderful start to this school year we have had in ELA! Students brought their "A" game to kick off the 2023-2024 school year at TCS. It has been great fun reacquainting with students and getting to know new students. New friendships have been forged and connections have occurred within the walls of RM 9 through our study of the works of Edgar Allan Poe, as well as exploring such writing genres like Zines, Six-Word-Stories, and Haikus.



Spotlight on **POE**:

Our current literary learning unit is centered around some of E. A. Poe's most read works, and a few that aren't so well known. Titles that we have analyzed and enjoyed so far are: the short story *Tell-Tale Heart*, the poem "Annabel Lee", the poem "The Raven", the poem "The Bells", the short story *The Mask of the Red Death*, and the short story *The Cask of Amontillado*. Students have learned the concept of "Unity of Effect" that Poe believed in and have discussed that there is an "invisible" string, or motif, that connects every piece of literature that Edgar Allan Poe wrote. We have been enjoying rating each text that we read as we move through our unit as well as looking for connections to other texts or artistry. Students will be Poe experts for our upcoming field trip to Hedgerow Theater to see their Poe Festival!

Student work ZINES & SIX-WORD-STORIES

Students learned about the pop culture writing genre, Zines, at the beginning of the year. Not only did they learn about a writing style and technique that derived from magazines and became wildly popular in the 1970s, students also had a chance to express themselves. I would say making Zines was a hit from the first step of folding paper to its completion! TCS students are no strangers to writing a Six-Word-Story and jumped right into doing so. We added a visual arts aspect this time around by using Canva to illustrate their stories. Take a look at these works of art and self-expression!










Mrs. Phillips' Transition Class:

Book Recommendation: For Students and Parents

The Boy, the Mole, The Fox and the Horse by Charlie Mackesy

A few years ago, a dear friend and colleague gave me the book, *The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse* as a gift. I was perplexed because, at first glance, it looks like a picture book for children. I immediately changed my mind after the first few pages. This book is about life, friendship, kindness, struggle, and connection. It is thought provoking and an inspiration to read. I too began giving it as a gift.



The author, artist Charlie Macksey, says the book started out as a series of pen and ink drawings that he would share with friends and on Instagram. People responded to the drawings and their written words of kindness, vulnerability, and wisdom. His work made a difference in the lives of people who needed inspiration, especially during the pandemic, and his Instagram account has grown to 1.8 million followers. Contacted by a publisher, he drawings were turned into a book that has sold over 8 million copies worldwide and is on multiple bestsellers lists.

Today, Charlie's book is used in schools, mental health settings, yoga classes and everywhere kindness is spread. It has become an animated short film and won an Academy Award this year. You can find the movie on Apple+ along with a documentary about Charlie Mackesy. We also use it here at TCS in Transition class.

Mrs. Frederick's Technology Classes:

Mrs. Fredericks's **coding classes** are learning to code for the web. They're learning HTML (Hypertext Markup Language) to set the structure of the page, and CSS (Cascading Style Sheets) to set the style of the page (such as color of text).

Mrs. Fredericks's **STEAM class** just finished learning about AI (Artificial Intelligence). We learned about the pros and cons of AI, how it can be used both now and in the future. We explored creating poetry in the style of different writers, such as Edgar Allan Poe. We created music with a program, "Blob Opera," and created AI images by typing in text describing the image. Finally, we discussed why you shouldn't use AI to write your papers!

Mrs. Fredericks's **Game Design class** just finished learning the basics of creating games using a program created by MIT, "Scratch." This program uses block coding to simplify creating the games so students can learn the structure, such as If, then statements, forever statements, loops, variables, etc., without learning both the code and structure at the same time. We are about to start a new program using a game engine called, "Construct 3." This is a more advanced program where they can make more complicated games.

Ms. Tilmon's Science Class:

In the first period **Environmental Science class**, students placed mesh bags filled with leaves from four different species of tree in the creek in our nature center. In three to four weeks, we will collect the bags and leaves and sort through the leaf litter, looking for aquatic animals, such as dragonfly naiads maturing in the water. The leaves are from a Kentucky coffee tree, a red maple, a red oak, and a swamp dogwood. We will analyze the data to determine if certain aquatic animals have a preference for the leaves from a certain tree species. Photographs courtesy of DJ Tedrow.
