#### ELA 2





- 10. Don't expect anything different with newer projects; this franchise is extremely predictable.

















#### Mrs. Griffith's English Classes:





**Fourth Period** ELA class completed their study of *Pax* by creating google slides projects which they presented to their peers. Check them out in the photos! Color, font,




format, words...they are all writing!

#### Mrs. Frederick's Technology Classes:







#### TCS STAR PARTY

TCS hosted an exciting multi-activity STAR PARTY on March 12, 2024. Festivities started around 3:30 PM with sports activities, lively conversations, and good use of our high flying swings. Students enjoyed some snacks before board games were enjoyed by some in the APR while others built WarHammer figures in Mr. Brady's classroom. Outside activities resumed until pizza was served. As a preview of what was to come, Miss Tilmon gave a presentation about what it means to do "star hopping" aided by projected pictures of the constellations as they appear in the sky, as they appear with connecting lines, and as they appear with superimposed images of what the constellations appear to depict. As the sky began to darken, three telescopes were set up on the blacktop on the western side of the school, and multiple binoculars were made available. Students and adult chaperones were thrilled and amazed to see clear images of the craters on the Moon, which was in its crescent phase, as well as Jupiter and a few of its moons. Miss Tilmon gave us a guided tour of the constellations as she demonstrated how to do "star hopping" in the beautiful, dark night sky. Thank you, Miss Tilmon, and to everyone who helped to create wonderful memories that also strengthened friendships within our school community!


